WOVE Legislative Update for Career and Technical Education

2025 Legislative Session | March 27, 2025

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This week has been all about the budget if you haven't noticed through the news and social media. The operating and transportation proposals were uploaded to the state website on Monday and since then it has been a deep-dive into what has changed. This edition of the *WOVE* will focus on Section 522 of the current operation budget as it has seen substantial changes.

Section 522 is the section of the budget that holds roughly \$80 million in dedicated funding for programs like CTSO operating funds, Project Lead The Way, Core Plus, First Robotics, OSPI CTE Equipment Grants, and other buckets of funding. For comparison you can see the 2023-2025 Section 522 here. The House version of the budget completely stripped the section and its funding and you can see the abbreviated version proposed by the Senate in this version.

The Senate version of the budget funds the programs within Section 522 through the 2026 fiscal year; but, those line items get abbreviated in the 2027 year with an eventual phase out. The WA-ACTE team has reached out directly to members on both the appropriations and education committees, to OSPI, and to the Governor's office. We have requested the section be put back in via a proviso or any other method to restore the section and the vital funding therein. If you are able to reach out to your lawmakers in both chambers, please do so ASAP to encourage them to maintain the current funding for these programs.

As a member of the School Funding Coalition, which is working on funding K-12 Education overall, a WACTA representative and Tim Knue join in those efforts and share with them our specific needs and efforts concerning the budget.

Budget proposal overviews:

Senate Democrats' Proposal:

- Overall K-12 Investment: Beyond special education, the Senate's budget includes approximately \$2 billion more for K-12 schools over the four-year outlook, focusing on school operating costs and special education. To support these enhancements, the Senate's plan anticipates \$16 billion in new revenue, partly derived from increased taxes on high-income individuals and corporations.
- Special Education Funding: The Senate proposes an additional \$2 billion over the next four years for special education services across Washington's 295 public school districts. This investment aims to fulfill the state's constitutional obligation to fund basic education, including special education, despite fiscal challenges.
- MSOC Increases: minimal increases are proposed, but fall far short of the Coalition goals and needs of districts.

House Democrats' Proposal:

- Overall K-12 Investment: The House budget proposes a \$750 million annual investment in K-12 education, with a significant portion allocated to school operating costs and special education. Similar to the Senate, the House plan relies on new taxes, estimating \$15 billion in additional revenue over the next four years to balance the budget.
- Special Education Funding: The House suggests a more conservative increase of \$482 million over the next four years for special education, reflecting a more cautious approach to spending amid budget constraints.
- MSOC Increases: minimal increases are proposed, but fall far short of the Coalition goals and needs of districts.

The House version of the budget relies on the following increases in funding buckets to provide relief to school districts:

March 27 will see many amendments and provisos to the operating budgets and even after today we won't see the final versions until the floor debate has been completed on each bill and the two versions go through the reconciliation process.

<u>House Bill 1167</u> - Directing the statewide Career and Technical Education task force to consider expanding and strengthening certain educational opportunities for careers in maritime professions. This bill had a successful hearing on March 13 and was voted out of Committee during executive session on March 20 by a unanimous voice vote. <u>This bill was successfully approved out of committee and now sits in Senate Rules with just two more hurdles to completion</u>.

NTIB Bills - Attached

Bills that are necessary to implement the budget were introduced late last week. These are revenue bills that don't have to go through the regular scrutiny of typical hearings and process because they have to be passed in order to legally pass the operating budget.

For your curiosity, you can view all of the bills that cleared the first half cut-offs for yourself in this attached PDF. These bills are still alive as we move through the second half.

As we go throughout the session you can follow along the <u>daily schedule of the legislature</u> and see the <u>Senate Floor Calendar</u> and the <u>House Floor Calendar</u>.

In Policy action with the Profession Educators Standards Board (PESB) this last week, the PESB took board action to rescind their approval for the ESD 101 Plan II CTE Certification Program, known as the Online Professional Learning Academy (OPLA). The Washington ACTE officers, WACTA, and Skill Center Association leaders have responded to the action with a letter to the PESB, OSPI, Education Committee Chairs, and Governor Ferguson asking for the PESB to withdraw their action or at least have an expedited process for reinstatement. It is also important to have others who may be concerned with this action to contact the PESB and others, because of the loss of this and possibly others over time will only leave the option of continuous Conditional CTE educators in the classroom, resulting in lower quality CTE standards and possible closure of programs. Through the WOVE we will continue to keep you up to date as things develop.
